The tondo "Fragment II" is so powerfully rendered that its round shape gives the sensation of peering through a powerful telescopic eye at some fine design elements which lead to abstract designs, as well as real forms in nature, fulfilling the deepest meaning of trompe l'oeil. Her sense of depth in the rough earth formations gives immediate impact. "Gorge VI," shows the depths and heights of these stone gorges, in their massiveness. Though man is absent, the artist speaks of loneliness and nature's greatness.
